



CHANGES TO REPORTING OF NOTIFIABLE DISEASES AND CONDITIONS REGULATIONS & MULTI-SYSTEM INFLAMMATORY SYNDROME IN CHILDREN (MIS) REPORTING PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE BULLETIN

The Nova Scotia College of Nursing (NSCN) is the regulatory body for licensed practical nurses (LPNs), registered nurses (RNs) and nurse practitioners (NPs) in Nova Scotia. Our mandate is to protect the public by promoting the provision of safe, competent, ethical and compassionate nursing services by our registrants.

The [Health Protection Act](#) requires that specific diseases and conditions listed in the Reporting of Notifiable Diseases and Conditions Regulations are reported. Recent changes in this legislation have an impact on a nurse's accountability to report to Public Health Services at Nova Scotia Health.

Effective November 9th, 2021 SARS-CoV-2 (COVID-19) has been added to the list of reportable diseases under the regulations. Additionally, multi-system inflammatory syndrome in children (MIS-C) is also notifiable to Public Health. MIS-C is a rare post-infectious complication, occurring between two to six weeks following SARS CoV-2 infection.
